Will Thomas: "Why the Digital? Why the Digital Liberal Arts?" Lecture Recording

On Dec. 8, distinguished historian William G. Thomas III gave the inaugural public lecture in the Digital Liberal Arts speaker series. His lecture, "Why the Digital? Why the Digital Liberal Arts?," assessed the current state of the "the digital" in higher education, including the digital humanities, and made the case for integrating digital research practices and pedagogies into the liberal arts more fully and broadly than has yet been realized. The talk critically appraised the digital humanities as well as examined models of collaboration and integration of research and teaching that can be applied across the liberal arts. Tool Spotlight: DiRT Directory

The [DiRT Directory](#) is a registry of digital research tools for scholarly use. It's a great place to start if you think you have a digital project but aren't sure which tool to use. DiRT makes it easy for digital scholars and others conducting digital research to find and compare resources ranging from visual editing software to network visualization to collaborative writing tools. The large directory is regularly updated by scholars who use the software included in the directory.
