Welcome to Japanese 301! In this class, we will be actively using new and previously learned expressions through discussions on various Japan-related issues. Selected topics include: religion, pop culture, performing arts and education. We will be solidifying communicative skills in speaking, listening, writing and reading, as well as sociocultural knowledge associated with language use, both in personal and academic settings. This semester, we will focus on expressing opinions through solid argumentation and strengthening the accuracy, and appropriateness of spoken and written styles.

GOALS AND EXPECTATIONS FOR THIRD-YEAR JAPANESE

As we are transitioning into advanced-level Japanese, this course focuses on the skills required to process longer texts and conversations that use a broader range of vocabulary, kanji and grammatical structures than in previous levels. You will be learning not only to recognize these expressions, but also to produce them appropriately in various social situations (using honorifics, casual forms, etc.). Reading materials frequently contain unfamiliar expressions, technical words or proper nouns. Accordingly, you will be developing strategic and studying skills, such as: to use context to infer or anticipate messages; to grasp main points as well as critical details; to internalize new materials through personal contexts; and to present complex ideas keeping your audience in mind. We will also practice building well-structured arguments as part of Academic Japanese, an integral component for this course (see p.2 C). You will be writing short paragraphs in class, two thesis-based essays (400-600 characters), and a speech script (about 800 characters) to be presented and discussed at the end of the semester. Other activities and assignments include: class discussions; frequent exercises and quizzes; preview and review sheets, lesson tests; two oral tests; and a final exam.

(1) 準備と参加 Preparation and Participation

You are expected to attend every class. Look up in advance key words/concepts on reading materials that you think are critical for following the lecture and discussion. You may also be asked to read passages, express your opinions and present dialogues and informal speeches. Participation grade will be checked daily as follows:

100% (1 pts.) present, prepared and actively participated for the whole class period 50% (0.5 pt.) late/leave early (missed up to 15 min.), or unprepared absent or missed more than 15 min. or no participation

You are required to attend at least 10 Japanese Table lunches, Japanese House or other Japan-related events over the semester. Please plan ahead!

(2) 練習問題 Exercises 10% [The lowest grade will be dropped.]

Please check each lesson schedule (\star = to submit, \star = checked in class). Textbook (\square) and workbook (\bowtie) exercises will be assigned frequently as preparatory work (予習 "yoshuu"). They will be graded collectively on a scale of 1-10 at the end of each lesson. Additional worksheets (\square) will be graded on a scale of 1-10 each. Sloppy or incomplete work will be returned for a redo and will receive half credit upon completion.

(3) 小テスト Quizzes 10% (単語 5% / 漢字 5%) [The lowest grade will be dropped.]

For each chapter, you will have one (or more) vocabulary quiz (5 %) and a kanji quiz (5 %). Please check each lesson schedule for dates. Note that the main purpose of these quizzes is to prepare you for the discussion of the day, rather than to test your memorization skills. Kanji quizzes may include items from earlier lessons.

(4) 口頭試験 Oral Interview Test 10%

You will have two oral interviews. You will be talking with an instructor about topics related to the materials covered in class in an interview or conversation style. You will be asked questions and occasionally prompted/expected to initiate conversations as well. A list of topics will be provided.

(5) レッスンテスト Lesson Tests 20%

There will be four lesson tests (LL 6-9, 5% each). L 10 content will be included in the final exam.

(6) 期末試験 Final Exam 15% total

The final exam will be conducted during the exam period. The exam covers lessons 6-10.

C. ACADEMIC JAPANESE GRADES [20% TOTAL]

(7) 小論文 Essays 10%

There will be several in-class/take-home essays related to the materials covered in class.

(8) スピーチ Persuasive Speech 10%

You will be preparing a short speech (about 5 minutes, 800 characters). Craft your script and practice your delivery so that your view of a certain social/cultural issue would be convincing to your audience. Think of this as a speech contest or a mini "TED talk". Your topic may not necessarily be about Japan, but it must be related to one of the Tobira lessons we have covered.

COURSE GRADE

Grades on individual items will be updated periodically on Canvas. The weighted total course grade (based on categories (1)-(8) above) will translate to letter grades as follows. Borderline grades will be rounded up or down depending on your daily effort and participation, and overall proficiency as assessed by the oral interviews and the final exam. You will be given midterm feedback.
