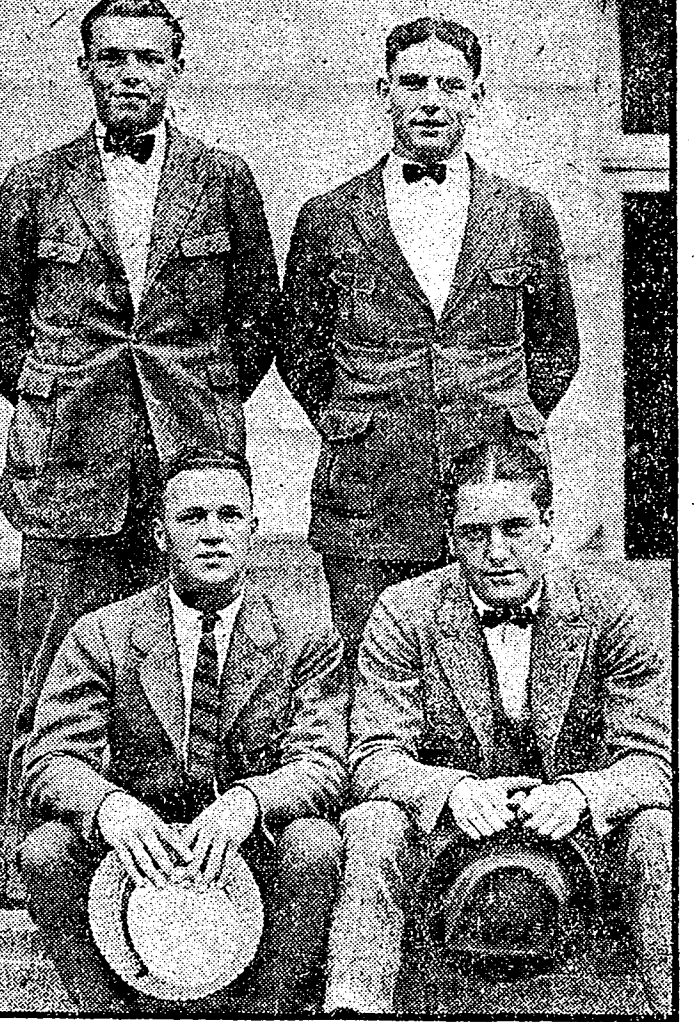
CARDS DIVIDE WITH PIRATES
