
# Middlebury Sailing

Practice also looked different due to the fact that we were not attending regattas this season. We were able to tailor practices more to each individual's skill level and have separate groups working on different skill sets that they felt would best serve them. With this arrangement, we saw immense improvement across the board, from our most experienced sailors to our new sailors who had never been in a boat before the first day of practice.

This all would not have been possible without our interim coach, Rich. Unfortunately, our coach Tom was not with us this season. We missed him deeply and can't wait to have him back on the water with us soon. However, we were so happy to have Rich with us this Fall. 
#### A Postcard from Coach Tom
